Important: Please Read!

2023 Rule Changes:

Birth and Possession: Project animals must be male calves born between February 1, 2023 and April 1, 2023. Project animals must be in the possession and care of the member by April 15, 2023.

General DBF Rule #6 – **Calves must be fully de-horned and castrated by tag-in June 3, 2023. Pinching is prohibited. To attain full dehorning and castration these procedures should happen not later than 4 wks prior to tag-in.** Animals must be weaned and on full feed prior to the fair or they will not be permitted to show or sell. Calves must be vaccinated twice, 2 to 4 weeks apart, by ENTRY DEADLINE (IBR, BVD, P13, BRSV). Calves must also be vaccinated for Pasturella by ENTRY DEADLINE. **VACCINATIONS MUST BE LISTED ON THE JULY 28 ENTRY FORM.** *All animals maybe subject to home visits.”*

General DBF Rule # – All Entries are Due at midnight By or On JULY 28th - NO EXCEPTIONS/No Postmark sent. **No Changes will be permitted after entry deadline.**

General DBF Rule #10 Animals with horns (skull attached or a growth more than a half an inch from the skin) will be sent home. **(Dehorning is not just for the safety concerns of our exhibitor, but is also a requirement in many feed lots and will allow all our feeders to be more marketable to our brokers and buyers.)** Also, animals with testicular tissue or unruly animals (to the point where the Dairy Committee considers it to be a safety hazard) will not be shown in the show ring. Any questions please contact a Dairy Committee Member.

Tag-In All Dairy Beef Feeders will be identified with an ear tag only on June 3, 2023, 9 a.m. to 11am, at the fairgrounds. **REMEMBER:** Animals must have halters on. Calves must be de-horned and castrated by tag-in June 3, 2023. Pinching is prohibited.

Haul –In: Reminder tack must be moved in by Sunday and Animals only on Monday

General DBF Rule Dairy Beef Feeder calves will be checked by the veterinarian at the fair. Animals with warts, ringworm or horns will be sent home. (Horns reference rule #7)

DAIRY BEEF FEEDER RULES 2023

Stark County Fair General Rules

The Stark County Junior Fair operates under the authority of and in conjunction with the Stark County Senior Fair Board. The Junior Fair Board is a department of the Stark County Fair with its own objectives. These objectives in many instances, require rules or guidelines that differ significantly from those of other Stark County Fair Departments.

Any boy or girl enrolled in a Stark County Youth organization is eligible to participate in the Stark County Junior Fair. They must abide by the rules and age limitations of said youth organization (4H, FFA, Grange, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, etc.)

1. To participate in 4H activities, youth must comply with the State 4H membership policy. 4H eligibility begins at age 5 (and in kindergarten as of January 1) and ends December 31st of the year in which they attain the age of 19.
2. Exhibitors in 4H classes must be enrolled in 4H club work in Stark County. Exhibits must be from 4H projects approved by the State or Local Extension office.
3. All members are encouraged to show in open class events.
4. Health rules for the livestock exhibits are the same as those governing all open class exhibits. Health papers must be shown, if requested, to the proper person before an animal is assigned a stall.
5. The board of directors of the Stark County Agricultural Society will, to the best of their ability, safeguard persons, livestock and articles on the grounds, but will not be responsible for injury, damage, disease, theft or loss of any kind.
6. Animals released due to illness or injury must have a signed release from the Vet, Junior Fair Coordinator and/or barn superintendent. Any animal removed without proper permission will be subject to 1-year suspension.
7. Members must clean stalls or pens daily and keep the area neat and attractive. The committee reserves the right to withhold payment if any exhibitor does not keep his/her area clean and/or feed and water livestock.
8. Anyone assisting with showing another exhibitor's animal must be enrolled as a current 4H or FFA or other youth organization member in Stark County.
9. All animals must remain on exhibit at the fair until 6:00 p.m. on Monday, the last day of the fair, EXCEPT market animals. Market animals are released at 4:00 p.m.
10. All animals sold remain the property of the member and in the member's care until fair release time, 4:00 p.m., Monday, the last day of the fair.

11. Animals sold are not eligible to be shown again by that exhibitor or any other 4H or FFA member in any Junior Show in the county or state or independent fair. All Grand and Reserve Grand Champion market animals are terminal.
12. Exhibitors are responsible for their own veterinary bill.
13. Veterinarians assigned to the fair for check-in will decide all matters of health, presence of disease and stall release.
14. Ribbons and suitable award will be provided by the Fair Board. It is the privilege of the Fair Board to prorate cash premiums if the budget is exceeded.
15. Eligible youth may be members of both 4H (clubs) and vocational agriculture (FFA) or of either group. In all cases, separate and different projects (also different animals and/or products) must be carried in 4H and in vocational agriculture by a member belonging in both organizations. Examples of different and separate projects are sheep breeding, market lambs; pullets, broiler. The same or similar animals or products cannot be shown in both organizations even though they may be carried under different projects or programs, an animal or product may not be shown in more than one county in 4H or FFA classes.
16. Stark County youth programs and the Junior Fair Board will not condone the use of alcohol or drugs by any of its members, volunteers or anyone else associated with the Junior fair. The Junior Fair Coordinator, Junior Fair Board advisors, FFA advisors, Extension office and the Senior Fair Board will contact parents or legal authorities to handle individuals caught using or under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
17. In the event that a project animal dies after the designated possession date, members will not be permitted to replace the animal for the purpose of exhibition or sale in any Junior Fair event.
18. **All Entries are Due at midnight By or On JULY 28th - NO EXCEPTIONS! No Changes will be permitted after entry deadline.**
19. All market beef show grooming must be done by Stark County Junior Fair exhibitor or the exhibitor's immediate family limited to mom, dad, brother, sister grandparents. Also includes Stark County Junior Fair exhibitors. This includes all projects entered in the Stark County Jr. Fair show during the Stark County Fair August 29th to September 4, 2023. Consequence of rule is no show or sale of animal.
20. No one is to handle a junior fair member's animal(s) without the permission of the junior fair exhibitor unless there is an emergency. Committee members may handle animals during the normal course of their duties (i.e., show, sale, weigh-in, pictures, loading, unloading).
21. Judges' Decisions are Final.

22. Any Medical/School excuses must be submitted in writing to Committee Chair and Junior Fair Coordinator.
23. It is **MANDATORY** for **ALL Junior Fair Exhibitors** to attend a **QUALITY ASSURANCE CLINIC (QA)** by **JUNE 1** prior to the fair. Any Junior Fair Exhibitor who does not attend a **QUALITY ASSURANCE CLINIC (QA)** will not be able to show at the fair or bring a carcass.
24. Exhibitors must complete a **DRUG USE NOTIFICATION FORM** for all market animals and lactating animals prior to show. Those who do not comply **WILL NOT** be allowed to show! Ohio Revised Code 901-19-06 and 901-19-07 Mandated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture. All Junior Fair Livestock should be drug residue free on the first day of the fair unless specified on the DUNF. All members will be responsible for care of their market animals until completion of the Fair or until drug withdrawal period elapses or if quarantined.

General Rules DBF

- 1 Project animals must be male calves born between February 1, 2023 and April 1, 2023.
- 2 Animals weighing less than 400 pounds or more than 700 pounds at weigh-in on Monday, August 28, 2023, will be permitted to show and sell, **HOWEVER**, they will NOT be eligible to win Grand Champion or Reserve Champion. Exhibitors whose animals weigh- in within five pounds under or five pounds over these limits will have the option to re-weigh their animals **ONCE** at the end of the dairy feeder weigh –in, in order to qualify within the limits.
- 3 The Dairy Committee reserves the right to send unhealthy animals or ***animals weighing under 350 lbs. home*** with a minimum vote of half of committee members.
- 4 **Underweight and overweight animals will be sold alternately at the end of the Dairy Feeder Sale.**
- 5 Calves must be 100% one of the following breeds: Holstein, Jersey, Guernsey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, or Milking Shorthorn. Calves may be crosses of any of these dairy breeds. No beef crosses will be permitted. Committee reserves the right to make final decision on breed conformation of animals.
- 6 **Calves must be fully de-horned and castrated by tag-in June 4, 2023. Pinching is prohibited. To attain full dehorning and castration these procedures should happen no later than 4 wks. prior to tag-in.** Animals must be weaned and on full feed prior to the fair or they will not be permitted to show or sell. Calves must be vaccinated twice, 2 to 4 weeks apart, by ENTRY DEADLINE (IBR, BVD, P13, BRSV). Calves must also be vaccinated for Pasturella by ENTRY DEADLINE. **VACCINATIONS MUST BE LISTED ON THE JULY 29th ENTRY FORM. All animals maybe subject to home visits.**

- 7 Animals with horns (skull attached or a growth more than a half an inch from the skin) will be sent home. **(Dehorning is not just for the safety concerns of our exhibitors, but is also a requirement in many feed lots and will allow all our feeders to be more marketable to our brokers and buyers.)** Also, animals with testicular tissue or unruly animals (to the point where the Dairy Committee considers it to be a safety hazard) will not be shown in the show ring. Any questions please contact a Dairy Committee Member.
- 8 **Members in their first year of the project may only exhibit and sell one calf. Second year members of more of the project may exhibit and sell up to TWO calves. One extra animal per member project may be tagged in (i.e.- if you can show two animals you tag three animals. If you can show one animal you can tag two animals. Calves will be tagged in by family (same address) and not project member.)**
- 9 The use of legally approved growth promoting implants is permitted. The use of drugs, tranquilizers, hormones, feed additives, grooming aids, etc. should be done with extreme caution and within local, state, and federal regulations. Any losses or condemnation at slaughter, etc., resulting from use or misuse of such products will be the sole responsibility of the Junior Fair exhibitor.
- 10 Members enrolled in the Dairy Feeder Calf project are encouraged to attend any dairy beef clinic sponsored by the Junior Fair Dairy Committee. All members are encouraged to bring their project animal. **Members who attend may earn up to 5 Bonus Points toward their Skill- A- Thon score.**
- 11 Dairy Beef Feeder calves will be checked by the veterinarian at the fair. Animals with warts, ringworm or horns will be sent home. (Horns reference rule #7)
- 12 **Weigh-ins for Dairy Beef Calves will begin at 8 pm -10:00 pm on Mon, August 28, 2023 in the dairy barn.**
13. All deadlines, dates, rules and regulations for the Junior Fair Dairy Feeder project will be strictly enforced by the Dairy Committee.

Dairy Beef Feeder – Fair Rules

1. A member's Dairy Beef Feeder project exhibit must be stalled in the area assigned for his/her project. No other stall location will be permitted.
2. All animals must stay within the designated area (barn area, wash racks) during the fair. Animals cannot be outside the fence. If the animal is taken outside the fence, you will not be permitted to bring the animal back inside the fence.
3. Kickboards at least 6" high must be placed behind the animals. Members must clean stalls and keep area neat and attractive at all times while exhibiting at the fair.
4. All members should be present during tagging, weigh-in and photographs of their own

animals.

5. Dairy Beef Feeders must be double restrained in the barn at the fair. One restraint is to be a halter; the second restraint is to be a collar or neck tie.
6. *All pens must be cleaned out at the conclusion of the fair. THERE WILL BE NO PEN CLEANING DURING LOAD-OUT UNTIL AFTER 10PM. **If you do not clean out your pen, you will be assessed a \$10 per animal fee (deducted from your check) and may be unable to show at FAIR the following year.** All pens must be cleaned out before September 8, 2023.*
7. All animals and stalls must be cleaned by 10:00 a.m. DAILY. Each exhibitor is responsible for his/her animal. **YOU MUST CLEAN UP AFTER YOUR ANIMAL WHEREVER THE ANIMAL HAS BEEN OR IS GOING (wash rack, aisles, milking parlor, show/sale arena, etc.) or you may be subject to a fine for each offense.**

Purchase of Animal

Project animals must be male calves born between February 1, 2023 and April 1, 2023. Project animals must be in the possession and care of the member by April 15, 2023.

Tagging In

All Dairy Beef Feeders will be identified with an ear tag only on June 3, 2023, 9 a.m. to 11am, at the fairgrounds. **REMEMBER:** Animals must have halters on. Calves must be de-horned and castrated by tag-in June 3, 2023. Pinching is prohibited.

Skillathon

Skillathon and project records are mandatory for all dairy projects. Skillathon and project books must be completed by August 21, 2023. NO SHOWING OF THE ANIMAL IF SKILLATHON AND BOOK REQUIREMENTS ARE NOT COMPLETED BY THIS DATE.

Book Requirements- If you are enrolled in this project, you must take project book # 117DF that can be purchased through the Extension office.

Haul In

Reminder tack should be in by Sunday and Animals only on Monday

DAIRY BEEF FEEDER SHOW:

1. Calves must be broken to lead by fair time.
2. All dairy beef feeder show grooming must be done by Stark County Junior Fair exhibitors or their immediate family (mom, dad, brother, sister).

3. Dairy Beef Feeder Calves should be fitted and shown in the same manner as a beef animal. The use of show sticks is permitted. Exhibitors **must** wear clean jeans. A western shirt or blouse is recommended. T-shirts, slogan shirts, or clothing with advertising is highly discouraged. Solid shoes or boots **must** be worn, no tennis shoes.
4. The Dairy Committee will divide the animals into weight classes for the show and will decide the number of classes and number of animals in each class. The first and second place animals in each weight class will show for Champion and Reserve Champion (with the exception of the Lightweight and Overweight classes).
5. The Dairy Beef Feeder Calf Show will be held in the BellStores Arena, Wednesday, August 30, 2023 at 9:00 a.m.
6. The judge will recognize every exhibitor. The judge's decision is final.
7. Each exhibitor is responsible for getting his/her animal in the correct class as announced.

DAIRY BEEF FEEDER SHOWMANSHIP:

Dairy feeder showmanship will be held at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, August 29, 2023 in the New Arena. Classes are as follows: (All ages are as of January 1 of the current year)

Senior Division	15 years and up
Intermediate Division	12 – 14 years
Junior Division	9 – 11 years
Sr. First Year Division	First-year Dairy Feeder exhibitor, Age 12 and over
Jr. First Year Division	First-year Dairy Feeder exhibitor, Age 11 and under
Champion of Champions	

*The winners of each division are eligible for the Champion of Champion class until they become eligible for the next age division. They must win that division before they are eligible for the Champion of Champions class again. Winners can only win once in their age group, then they are eligible for Champion of Champions only until they reach the next age division. Second place age division winners **MAY** be eligible to compete in Champion of Champions **AT THE JUDGE'S DISCRETION**. Second place age division winners will compete in their appropriate age division the next year.

Showmanship rules are as follows:

- a. All animals shown must be the project of the exhibitor in the contest.
- b. Placing ribbons will be awarded in each division (except Champion of Champions) for the first five places.

Trophies will be awarded to the following class winners: Senior, Intermediate, Junior, First Year Divisions, Champion of Champion, Reserve Champion of Champion.

DAIRY BEEF FEEDER SALE:

1. **The Dairy Beef Feeder Calf Sale will be held in the New Arena at approximately 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 31, 2023.** Release time for the Dairy Feeders is the same as for all other market animals. Members remain responsible for the care of their animals until release.
2. To cover Auction, Promotional, “Thank you’s” and miscellaneous expenses, there will be \$37.00 flat fee (\$35.00 plus \$2.00 Beef Check-Off Fee) for the Grand Champion, \$37.00 flat fee(\$35.00 plus \$2.00 Beef Check-Off fee) for the Reserve Grand Champion. For all other animals, \$37.00 flat fee (\$35.00 plus \$2.00 Beef Check-Off Fee)will be deducted from each check.
3. On the night of the Dairy Beef Feeder Sale, each exhibitor will be receiving an envelope. Do not give it to your buyer. Inside the envelope there will be instructions (please read them) and Thank You cards for your buyer(s). Cards will need to be filled out and deposited in the box at the display in the Dairy Barn at the fair. **Deadline for turning in Thank You cards is 12 noon, Sunday, September 3, 2023.** Missing the deadline will result in the delay of receiving your check for your project.
4. The Dairy Committee will be providing a token thank-you to the buyers the night of the sale. **Project members do not need to provide thank you gifts the night of the sale for their buyers.**
